## Description

The Prize was established in 2022 and is funded by the Auckland Bioengineering Institute.

The main purpose of the Prize is to recognise outstanding achievement in doctoral research in the Auckland Bioengineering Institute.

## Selection process

- Nomination is made to the Scholarships Office
- The Prize is awarded by the University of Auckland Council on the recommendation of the Director of the Auckland Bioengineering Institute

## Regulations

1. The Prize will be known as the Auckland Bioengineering Institute Prize for Best Doctoral Thesis.
2. One Prize will be awarded annually and will be for the value of \$1,000.
3. The Prize will be awarded to the student who, in the opinion of the sub-committee formed by the Associate Director (Postgraduate Research) for the Auckland Bioengineering Institute to judge the nominations, completed the best doctoral thesis in the previous year (see Note I).
4. To be eligible for consideration for a Prize a thesis must have i) satisfied all requirements for the award of a doctoral degree between 1 January and 31 December of the year preceding the year of the award of the Prize, ii) been submitted for examination within 48 months of equivalent full-time enrolment in the doctorate (subject to Note II), and iii) been nominated by the Auckland Bioengineering Institute for the Vice-Chancellor's Prize for Best Doctoral Thesis.
5. The Prize will be awarded by the University of Auckland Council on the recommendation of the Director of the Auckland Bioengineering Institute (or nominee).
6. In the event that the Auckland Bioengineering Institute nominates more than one thesis for the Vice-Chancellor's Prize for Best Doctoral Thesis, the Director of the Auckland Bioengineering Institute will determine whether the Prize may be

shared.

7. The University of Auckland Council is not obliged to make an award if it is determined there is no candidate that meets the criteria and/or no candidate of sufficient merit.
8. The University of Auckland Council can amend or vary these regulations provided that there is no departure from the main purpose of the Prize.
9. Notes [I]-[II] below are deemed to be Regulations.

- I. "Completed" means that all requirements for the award of the doctoral degree have been satisfied.*
- II. An exception to the eligibility requirement at Regulation 4(ii) may be made where a student had an extension of no longer than three months as a result of disruptions arising from COVID-19.*
