## Description

---

The Prize was established in 2007 and is funded by the law firm Wilson Harle of Auckland.

The main purpose of the Prize is to recognise and encourage excellence in the study of negotiation, mediation and dispute resolution.

## Selection process

---

- Nomination is made to the Scholarships Office
- The Prize will be awarded by the University of Auckland Council upon the recommendation of the Dean of the Faculty of Law

## Regulations

---

1. The Prize will be known as the Wilson Harle Prize in Negotiation, Mediation and Dispute Resolution.
2. One Prize will be awarded annually and will be of the value of \$1000.
3. The Prize will be awarded annually to the student enrolled in a Bachelor of Laws (LLB) or associated conjoint degree, or a Bachelor of Laws (Honours) (LLB(Hons)) who achieved the highest mark in LAWGENRL 424 Negotiation, Mediation and Dispute Resolution. As a minimum standard the student must have achieved an A- grade.
4. The Prize will be awarded by the University of Auckland Council upon the recommendation of the Dean of the Faculty of Law (or nominee).
5. The University of Auckland Council will not be bound to award the Prize if it is determined there is no candidate that meets the criteria and/or no candidate of sufficient merit.
6. In the event of a tie, the Dean of the Faculty of Law (or nominee) will determine whether the Prize may be shared.
7. The University of Auckland can amend or vary these regulations, in consultation with the donors, provided that there is no departure from the main purpose of the Prize.
