Master of Organisational Psychology programme INFORMATION FOR PROSPECTIVE APPLICANTS

The 180-point 'named' Master of Organisational Psychology can be completed in three semesters of study full-time or six semesters of study part-time.

Applications open on **1 October**, and must be received **before 1 December**

The MOrgPsych Research Masters and the MOrgPsych Taught Masters

Recognising the diversity of aspirations among students who seek postgraduate level training in Organisational Psychology, we cater for those who seek a strong research component (the MOrgPsych research stream), potentially with the desire to progress to a research degree (PhD), and also to those who are not so interested in independent research but more in a career in the field (the MOrgPsych taught stream).

The key components are a thesis for the research stream (90 points), or a dissertation for the taught stream (45 points). Entry to the research stream is dependent on a minimum GPA at point-of-entry to the thesis, and prior satisfactory performance for taught courses in the early part of the degree.

How the MOrgPsych is structured

Research Masters

- 45 points: PSYCH 761, 766, 744
- 45 points: from GLMI 705, 706, PSYCH 715, 716, 717, 731, 758, and from either GLMI 702 or 710;
- 90 points: PSYCH 794 Thesis

Taught Masters

- 45 points: PSYCH 761, 766, 744
- 90 points: from GLMI 705, 706; PSYCH 715, 716, 717, 731, 758, and from either GLMI 702 or 710
- 45 points: PSYCH 790 Dissertation

A student must achieve a Grade Point Average of 5.0 or higher in the first 60 points of taught courses prior to enrolment in PSYCH 794.

A student admitted to this programme must complete the University of Auckland Academic Integrity Course as specified in the Enrolment and Programme Regulations, Academic Integrity, of the *University Calendar*.

What qualifications do I need to apply?

An applicant must have:

either

completed the requirements for the Degree of Bachelor of Arts with a major in Psychology, Bachelor of Science with a major in Psychology, Graduate Diploma in Arts in Psychology, Graduate Diploma in Science in Psychology, or Graduate Diploma in Applied Psychology from this University with a Grade Point Average of 5.00 or higher in 45 points above Stage II in Psychology.

or

completed the equivalent degree in an approved subject areas (including business, education, and health science) with a grade point average of 5.00 or higher in 75 points above Stage II.

and

passed PSYCH 306 Research Methods in Psychology (or an equivalent course).

In exceptional circumstances, Senate or its representative may approve the admission of a student who has attained at least three years of extensive relevant, practical professional or scholarly experience equivalent to the requirements above.

Postgraduate students new to the University of Auckland

Applicants for postgraduate programmes who have not been enrolled previously at The University of Auckland must apply for admission using the [online application process](#).

Your application for admission to the University of Auckland must be made as early as possible to prevent delays in the assessment of your qualifications.

Verification of your previous university qualifications is required by the Admissions office.

You also need to submit the [supplementary application form](#) by **1 December**. Supplementary applications can be submitted from 1 October onwards.

Please note that this degree is not accredited for registration as a Psychologist, and eligibility into further study in an accredited programme should be discussed with the relevant university.
