Larry Murphy: The politics of housing affordability: Is housing supply the answer? 12noon-1pm, Design Lecture Theatre, Conference Centre, 22 Symonds Street, Building 423.

Fast-tracking housing supply has assumed a central role in political responses to the enduring problem of housing affordability in New Zealand. This seminar critically examines the economic drivers of house prices and the dynamics of housing policy formation. Paying particular attention to the Housing accords and special housing areas act (2013), Larry Murphy will examine the potential for ongoing conflict between local and central government over the release of land for housing development. The School of Architecture and Planning and Transforming Cities are pleased to host Professor Murphy, Professor of Property in the Business School at the University of Auckland. He is currently part of a research project entitled "Finding the Best Fit: Housing, Downsizing and Older People in a Changing Society" that is funded by MBIE. He was a researcher on three Centre for Housing Research Aotearoa/New Zealand (CHRANZ) projects that addressed tenure dynamics, regional housing issues and Māori housing disadvantage. In 2010, on the basis of his contribution to property research, he was appointed a Fellow of the Royal Institution of Chartered Surveyors (UK).
