Patient Safety: The non-technical skills required of nurses

There is increasing evidence that poor performance of non-technical skills at the 'sharp end' of healthcare is a significant factor contributing to preventable adverse patient events. Nurses provide the majority of care for patients as they are with the patients in hospitals 24 hours a day 7 days a week and therefore in a prime position for improving both the quality of care and the quality of patient outcomes. In this talk I will present the findings from my PhD research which investigated the social and cognitive non-technical skills required of nurses for safe and effective care.
