Listening up: the recipients' perspective on people speaking up in the operating room

Speaking up to express concerns or challenge unsafe actions can prevent patient harm. However, for patient harm to be avoided, the recipient of speaking up must listen and take corrective action.

I will present early findings from research on operating room staff perspectives about the experience of being spoken up to. How does it feel when someone points out a mistake you have made in front of your team? What factors influence how people interpret and respond to speaking up? How do reactions to speaking up shape future speaking up behaviour, patient care and team functioning?
